The first settlement was built in 1803 as a punishing colony on the eastern coast of the Derwent River. Colony was moved to a better place at the present site of Hobart in 1804. Name of the capital originate from Lord Hobart who was the Colonial Secretary. The population of the town was growing rapidly by free settlers and the convict population. City's harbour was one of Australia's best deepwater ports and was the centre of the Southern Ocean whaling and seal trade. Hobart rapidly grew into a major port, with associated businesses such as shipbuilding. Hobart Town turned into a city in 1842, and was renamed Hobart in 1875.
